

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What tonight's play is all about

Charles Condomine, a successful novelist, is gathering material for a new book whose plot involves spiritualism. He therefore invites Madame Arcati, the eccentric local medium, to conduct a seance at his home for himself and his second wife, Ruth — with Dr. Bradman (the village G.P.) and his wife to add scientific weight. Charles intends to ferret out the disreputable tricks of a bogus medium; but unfortunately Madame Arcati is not as bogus as she seems, and Charles has overlooked the fact that Elvira, his first wife, "passed over" (mediums never say "die") some years previously and is consequently waiting on the Other Side. There are, furthermore, powerful forces unconsciously at work under his own roof. As a result, some hectic hours are passed at the Condomines' and a profound but not altogether unwelcome change takes place in Charles' life.

Blithe Spirit was written "between one Saturday and the next" in the Watch House, a cottage forming part of the Italianate Welsh village of Portmeirion.

Lesley Stockreisser

A newcomer to the Semi-Circle, Lesley began acting in mystery plays in the ruins of Coventry Cathedral. Later, at drama school she became an associate of the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art and now teaches English in Basle and looks after her two young sons.

Tony James

Tony, who describes himself as "young-and-a-half", has appeared in two previous plays for the Semi-Circle. He has always been interested in amateur theatre and belonged to a small company in the United Kingdom for several years. He now works in Basle as a computer programmer.

Richard Levitt

Richard hails from Los Angeles, California. He teaches at the Schola Cantorum and is familiar to the British community in Basle through his staging of "The Seaside Show" and "Old Time Music Hall". This is first assignment for the Semi-Circle.

Cynthia Baer

An American in the Semi-Circle's circle, Cynthia made her first public appearance in 1948! Now an editorial assistant with a publishing house in Basle, most of her acting experience comes from having taught English in the United States, Germany and Japan. She finds the prospect of "life after death" encouraging: "After all, it got me into Act III!"

Ruth Meier

Born in Birmingham, England, Ruth is third of a family of ten children and has three of her own. Her travels have taken her to Egypt, Australia and New Zealand, where she met and married her Swiss husband. This is her second appearance in a Semi-Circle production.

Joan Kuster

A Lancashire lass from Liverpool, Joan came to Basle in 1967, married a Swiss in 1969 and then spent four years in Australia. She played Miss Erikson in "Present Laughter" last year and assisted behind the scenes with many previous Semi-Circle productions.


Graham Simons

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The Semi-Circle

Our theatre group really dates back to 1967 when a few members of the British Circle in Basle got together regularly to read English plays.

The play-reading evenings were very informal and intended for our own entertainment but we did give one public presentation for the British Circle, reading scenes from "Pygmalion", "The Importance of Being Earnest" (produced in full in 1982) and "Blithe Spirit", which is our choice for this year's production.

When the leader of our group, Mrs. Esme Chesner, left Basle to return to England, the group broke up for some time but a chance suggestion by Ron Hill to revive the play-readings coincided with the "discovery" of Peter Broberg, who had trained in acting and production at The Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London. He agreed to help us form a drama group and so "The Semi-Circle" was born. The name stems from the British Circle, who first sponsored us and the semi-circle of chairs used in public play-readings. We are now a fully independent society.

Theatre being very much a part of the British way of life - most towns and even many small villages in Great Britain have amateur societies - most of our members had had some previous experience, while others were absolute beginners. We rehearsed in private homes, in a Fasnacht cellar and in a room at the Rialto, the scene of our first play-reading evenings in 1967.

Our first public play-reading in 1975 under Peter Broberg's direction was Oscar Wilde's "Lord Arthur Savile's Crime" followed by George Bernard Shaw's "Heartbreak House".

Then came the first full stage production in 1978 at the Borromäum Theatre - Alan Melville's "Dear Charles" - which was performed on two evenings. It was such a great success that in 1980 we extended the next play, Noel Coward[®]s "Hay Fever", for a further performance.

Between plays, in collaboration with "The Flowing Bowl", an enthusiastic group of male vocalists from the British Circle, we presented a "Jubilee Revue", to commemorate the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977, an "Old Time Music Hall" in 1978 and "A Seaside Show" in 1980.

In 1982, in order to satisfy the increased demand for seats, we moved our venue to the Bäumlihof Gymnasium for the production of Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest" followed in 1983 by Noel Coward's "Present Laughter".

This year Peter Broberg is taking a well-earned rest and we are pleased to welcome Richard Levitt, director of tonight's play, into our group.

Ron Hill, apart from taking part in some of the productions, was largely responsible for building up the business and behind-the-scenes sides of the Semi-Circle. He and his wife Anne, also a very active member, returned to England last year and we were sorry to lose them.

Amateur theatre productions mean a great deal of hard work but they also give us a lot of fun and, we hope, a great deal of pleasure to our audiences.
