





Introducing The Casts And Directors

Diana Zuger is no stranger to Semi-Circle productions and was last seen in the most recent major production "You Can't Take It With You" as a slightly crazy mother of a crazy family. So it's now back to basics as a middle-aged working lady.

Sheila McKenzie is often one of the "unseen" backstage crew and she has acquired such a reputation as a gossip in various Semi-Circle workshop productions that she has been made editor of the Semi-Circle newsletter. This is a true example of life imitating art.

Edward Atkinson has lived in Basle for 5½ years and works for a bank. His acting career has recently been filled with new challenges. He played a woman for the first time in last year's English Speaking Club/Semi-Circle joint production of "Cinderella" and tonight plays a limbless person for the first time.

Sonia Dell has learnt her trade as assistant to the director and stage manager in several major productions and by directing various one-act plays. In 1993 she directed the major production herself ("Lord Arthur Savile's Crime"). Learning lines was always a problem and so, being a dyed-in-the-wool bossy-boots, directing was the obvious solution.

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Michelle Florin was born just a few blocks away from here at the Frauenspital to a young woman from Bristol and a Bündtner from Prättigan. She grew up in Eastern Canada and the western United States and returned almost 4 years ago following university to discover her "roots" (it's just taking a little longer than she expected). She's been involved in almost all aspects of theatrical production and most recently directed her first production "The Man in a Case" in last year's workshop. She looks forward to returning to the stage in "Sure Thing".

Allen Holland first touched down in Switzerland during the summer of 1991, two weeks after graduating from the University of Texas Business School with a degree in Finance. His reason for leaving his home city of Houston, Texas, was to realise his dream of an international business career while experiencing different cultures. His daily role is that of a currency derivatives dealer. His other roles include musician, sportsman and actor. One role that he particularly connected with was that of Tony Kirby in last year's Semi-Circle production of "You Can't Take It With You". One of his favourite descriptions of the arts comes from George Jean Nathan: "Great art is as irrational as great music. It is mad with its own loyeliness".

Nina Meier-Bradlin was last seen as Alice in "You Can't Take It With You". She directed a student-written musical at the University of Michigan in 1990 and a summer camp production of a well-known agit-prop play, but this is her first time with the Semi-Circle (it may be her last for a long while! If you see her "bump" you'll know why).

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David Cox was born in Consett, Co. Durham and had his first acting role at an early age - as Dick Whittington's cat in the local Pantomime. His first (and last!) television appearance, as a choirboy, was on "Opportunity Knocks". Opportunity didn't knock and David went on to slaughter a number of good Shakespearean parts as a member of Salford University Theatre Company. Opportunity finally knocked for David when he came to Switzerland in 1985 and became a member of Himmelried "Männerchor" and "Dorfbühne". His role of Gordon in "Last Tango" marks his acting debut for the Semi-Circle. David's day-time role is that of "mad scientist" at one of the local pharmaceutical companies.

Eric Collino (biographical note): Play-readings, 8 pm; last Wednesday each month; Storchen Restaurant. Couldn't sound less threatening. Absolutely innocuous. We went (Eric and Marie-Louise). Got hooked. Four years ago. Lambs to the slaughter. Abandon hope all Ye who enter here. Both now involved in Semi-Circle productions, M.-L. off-stage, E. mostly on ("An Inspector Calls", "Lord Arthur Savile's Crime", "You Can't Take It With You", plus one or two one-acters). Lots of sweat, lots of fun. Not yet ready for the actor's silk dressing gown, but persevering. It's the teamwork that keeps drawing you in. Try it.

Joy Scherer hails from Leicester, England and first came to Basle in 1967. She joined the Semi-Circle in 1984, had her acting debut in the workshop "Fumed Oak" and since then has been involved, both on stage and off, in various productions. Her most recent appearance on stage was as Lady Julia in "Lord Arthur Savile's Crime". Her role as SC Treasurer - her longest-running performance to date - gives her the ideal spring-board for stepping into Joyce's shoes in "Last Tango".

Zuzana Cox was born in Prague and moved to England at the age of 8. Her theatrical career began at school where she played various demanding roles such as the Virgin Mary and the third King. At University she joined the drama group (where she met David) and took part in several serious plays such as "Macbeth" and "Antigone". Since coming to Switzerland 10 years ago Zuzana has appeared in two Swiss German plays in the village where she lives. During her spare time she plays the role of a mother and a teacher at the International School of Basle. This is her first performance with the Semi-Circle.

Caroline Weisskopf was born in Singapore and moved to England when she was 5. She spent most of her childhood in that hotbed of culture - Norfolk! In fact it was in her home village of Sutton (population about 50) that she had her first taste of amateur dramatics. This stimulating experience inspired her on to greater things, and she joined the Semi-Circle in 1986. She enjoys all aspects of the theatre - acting, prompting, make-up, etc. "Last Tango" is her second attempt at directing.

The Semi-Circle started as an off-shoot of the British Circle, but has since developed into a fully independent amateur dramatic society with regular large annual productions, most often at the Bäumlihof Gymnasium in Riehen, and workshops, generally at the Schönes Haus.

The first workshop, "Fumed Oak", was presented in 1986. The idea was to give untried talent a greater opportunity to perform on stage and courageous members the chance to try their hands at directing or learning the intricacies of the many important jobs of production planning, front of house or back-stage. Some of the directors providing your entertainment for tonight are taking on the responsibilities of directing for the first time.
