Since September 1970 Olivia and Horst Lang have managed the Basler Kindertheater, where they wrote plays, directed them, and made the set, and where the children, even very young ones, acted. After Horst Lang died in 1999, Olivia Lang ran the theater on her own with help from her assistant Priska Sager and the setdesigners Georg Steiner and Patric Clauss. They are supported by the "Verein für das Basler Kindertheater".

By now the original casts are adults, and sometimes their children take part in the Kindertheater productions. The Basler Kindertheater has become an institution, which is well known and greatly appreciated by the children of Basel both as actors and audience.

In May 1993 we arranged to use the Kindertheater for Alan Bennett's "Talking Heads" directed by Richard Levitt. It involved three monologues by Cynthia Baer, Joan Rogers, and Diana Zuger. When we approached Fr. Lang a few months ago she spoke of the fascination of the audience at that time, and was happy to arrange for us to use the Kindertheater for our spring production.

Both those of us for which the venue is new, as well as the veterans of 1993 involved in this production, are very much looking forward to using the theater
